In a letter published by *The News & Observer* on April 15, Duke's chief communications officer made several false claims in criticizing NC WARN and our earlier letter.

Among the most egregious was that NC WARN "fought [Duke's] plans to retire a coal plant in Asheville ...".

In fact, below are several of the numerous demands NC WARN made to close the coal plant – and a pending complaint calling for Attorney General Cooper to phase out all Duke Energy's coal units.

February 29, 2016, News Release:

Duke Energy can and should close the Asheville coal units now. Our position has been strengthened during this case: Duke's huge natural gas power plant is not needed, would be high-risk economically, and would accelerate the global climate crisis at the worst possible time.
